# Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act CRRSAA



## CRRSAA - Mental Health Block Grant



#### **Children Designated with SED**

- Expand current SED services through outreach services, SED treatment modalities, services to incarcerated and/or detention populations.
- Capacity building, increased training on best practices and suicide prevention activities.
- Establish a digital locker.



#### **Adults Designated with SMI**

- Expansion of outreach services, care coordination, evidence based practices, and services to incarcerated populations as it relates to COVID-19.
- Capacity and infrastructure building including opportunities for training in best practices and evidence-based practices.



#### **Crisis System**

- Operation of an access line or warm line options to crisis increase needs due to the pandemic.
- MHFA training to first responders.
- Hiring of outreach workers and peer support to assist with post crisis check in supports.
- Enhance coordination of care for incarcerated individuals.



- Expanding FEP services including treatment, staff time,
- outreach, services to incarcerated/detention, PPE.

  Capacity and infrastructure
- Capacity and infrastructure building to support needed growth.
- Establish statewide digital lockers for those experience homelessness.



## CRRSAA - Substance Abuse Block Grant



#### **Primary Prevention** (substance abuse related)

- Expand primary prevention services statewide to those impacted by COVID-19
- Expand training, coalition building, community mobilization, and screening with evidence-based tools.
- Implement SU prevention interventions targeted at criminal justice system.
- Identification of TA needs.

## Women's Services

- Integrate SUD treatment with health and family service agencies with a focus on pregnant women and new mothers.
- Implement a statewide harm reduction program through a RFP.
- Expand MAT using FDA-approved medications and accompanying psychosocial and recovery supports for women.
- Hire outreach workers for regular check-in for women Enhance crisis system to include post with SUD.
- Increased capacity for detox, supported ILS, and recovery homes

#### **General Support Services**

- Enhance workforce development for peer recovery specialist training including Project ECHO collaborative.
- Implement provision of SUD treatment services to juveniles in detention, reentry initiatives, in-reach and outreach.
- Expand harm reduction and overdose prevention strategies.
- crisis outreach and texting capabilities.
- Enhance culturally responsive services.

#### **Children Designated with SED**

- Early identification and referral for SED assessment
- Co-location with EBP for justice involved youth
- CPAP expanding access to primary care providers

- TA and monitoring for ACT, supportive housing, supported employment, and peer support
- Expansion of peer support services
- Expansion of bh providers to serve individuals with IDD
- Digital identification wallet

#### **Crisis System**

- Electronic crisis services locator
- Crisis wraparound with children with SED designation
- 23 hour crisis stabilization for children with a SED designation
- Short-term bh residential settings for children with SED designation

#### **First Episode Psychosis**

- FEP positions for outreach and treatment services
- EBP training and staff time
- Funding supplies for outreach

# Primary Prevention (substance abuse related)

- Capacity building in "prevention deserts" within the state to build services and coalitions
- Partnership development with institutions of higher learning to target 18-25 year olds
- Media campaigns related to underage drinking, binge drinking and marijuana use.
- Expand and increase primary prevention efforts statewide

#### **Women's Services**

- Develop and sustain women-only, culturally appropriate approaches to substance and alcohol use treatment for Native/American Indian women.
- Develop training to implement gender-specific SUD treatment for women.
- Maternal Mental Health Programs to support the complex OB and SUD needs for pregnant and postpartum women in recovery.
- Detox for substance-exposed newborns and supportive services to mothers through their nursery, provision of parenting courses.

#### **General Support Services**

- Address health disparities in relation to SUD needs in various communities.
- Support statewide approach to increasing screening for infectious disease.
- Digital Wallet/Locker technology
- Create and expand peer-based recovery for SUD needs

# MHBG Eligibility

MHBG funds are to be used solely for services for adults determined to have a SMI and children determined to have a SED, and evidence-based practices for first episode psychosis.

Client must be considered uninsured/underinsured



# SABG Eligibility

### Minimum Qualifications:

- Client must be Non-Title 19 XIX, and
- Client must indicate active substance use in the past 12 months.
- Exception of services available to Non-Title XIX clients (i.e. room and board, acupuncture, traditional healing).



# SABG Eligibility

## Funding is Prioritized for:

- Pregnant women/teenagers who use drugs by injection,
- Pregnant women/teenagers who use substances,
- Others persons who use drugs by injection,
- Substance using women and teenagers with dependent children, including women who are attempting to regain custody of their children, and
- All other Non-Title XIX eligible clients with a substance use disorder, regardless of gender (as funding is available).

# State Opioid Response II

- Funding Period: 9/30/20 9/29/22 (2 years)
- **Amount:** \$31,606,462 per year
- Area served: All Regions
- Population of Focus: individuals with active opioid use; individuals
  with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD); individuals at risk for opioid overdose;
  individuals with stimulant use disorder; individuals in recovery; and youth,
  parents, community members and health consumers unaware of the
  potential risks of opioid/stimulant misuse and abuse



# **Prevention Program Activities**

- Sustaining and Enhancing Naloxone Distribution
- Increasing Localized Community Opioid and Stimulant Prevention Efforts
  - SACLAZ Toolkit, Statewide Campaign, <u>TalkNowAz.com</u>
- Addressing Critical Prevention Deserts
  - Develop Substance Abuse Prevention Coalitions in Peoria,
     Glendale, Douglas, Greenlee, Apache Junction and Peach Spring



### **Treatment Activities**


- Increase navigation and access to medication-assisted treatment in metropolitan and rural areas in Arizona
  - Sustain <u>Opioid Treatment on Demand</u> 24/7 access point to receive immediate connection to treatment
- Increase street-based outreach to identify high-risk individuals, get them into treatment, and provide them with resource options in a timelier manner



# **Recovery Support**

- Increase recovery and supportive housing options
- Recovery Wellness Center
- Community Re-entry Projects Yavapai, Navajo, Apache, Pima, Pinal, Graham, Mohave
- Enhance support for opioid-exposed newborns and pregnant women who have opioid and stimulant use disorder





# American Rescue Plan Act HCBS Update

### American Rescue Plan Act of 2021



10% Increase to FMAP for HCBS

4/1/21 - 3/31/22


Provides 10 percentage point increase in federal matching funds (capped at 95 percent) for Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) to implement or expand one or more activities to enhance HCBS

## American Rescue Plan Act HCBS Funding Guidance

- HCBS provision offers temporary 10 percentage point bump for certain HCBS services
- Guidance issued by CMCS on 5/13/21 detailing:
  - o Services eligible for the enhancement and how to claim the enhancement
  - o How to demonstrate compliance with the ARP's non-supplantation language via a maintenance of effort on eligibility, covered services, and provider rates in effect as of April 1, 2021
  - o Examples of activities that enhance, expand, or strengthen HCBS
  - o New flexibilities on HCBS retainer payments allowing states to offer an additional three additional 30-day retainer payment periods in CY 2021
  - https://www.medicaid.gov/federal-policy-guidance/downloads/smd21003.pdf
- AHCCCS submitted the <u>ARPA HCBS spending plan 7/12/2021</u> after gaining approval for a thirty-day extension to obtain further stakeholder input
- CMS is requiring states to submit both an initial and quarterly HCBS spending plan and narrative to CMS on the activities that the state has and plans implement.
- There is opportunity to amend the initial spending plan through subsequent quarterly reports.

## ARPA HCBS Spending Plan - Partial Approval

- Arizona received partial approval of the spending plan on September 28, 2021
- The partial approval letter includes:
  - Verification that Arizona qualifies for the temporary 10 percentage point increase in FMAP for certain Medicaid expenditures,
  - Approval for the state to claim the increased FMAP for qualifying expenditures between April 1, 2021, and March 31, 2022,
  - A request for additional information that CMS needs before issuing full approval as Arizona further plans and develops the activities in its spending plan,
  - General considerations, and
  - Information related to the submission of subsequent quarterly spending plans.



## ARPA HCBS Spending Plan - Next Steps

- AHCCCS will be working with CMS to ensure they have information necessary to issue a full approval.
- AHCCCS will communicate updates with with stakeholders.
- Once full approval is received, AHCCCS will coordinate with the community and begin compiling workgroups for spending plan implementation.



### AHCCCS Enrollment: March 2020- October 2021





#### 1115 Waiver Extension

- On September 30, 2021 CMS extended AHCCCS' existing 1115 waiver for 1 year through
   September 30, 2022
- Grants authority for sixth year of the Targeted Investments Program
- Sunsets the AHCCCS Choice Accountability Responsibility Engagement (CARE) program (not implemented by the agency)
- Items in waiver renewal application to be negotiated
  - o Coverage for traditional healing
  - o Verbal consent in lieu of written signature for ALTCS members
  - Extended dental coverage for individuals receiving care in an IHS or 638 facility
  - o Targeted Investments 2.0
  - Housing and Health Opportunities demonstration
- Anticipate next demonstration period will run from Oct. 1, 2022 through Sept. 30, 2027



### AHCCCS State Fiscal Year 2023 Budget Proposal

- Enrollment growth projections (assumes PHE will end on 12/31/21; subject to change)
  - FY21 FY22: 7 percent
  - FY22 FY23: -8 percent
- Projected capitation rate growth
  - For CYE 2023 4.0%
    - CMS Office of the Actuary (National Health Expenditure for Medicaid) estimate 4.6 percent in 2023
- General fund increase of \$358.8 million above appropriated amount for FY 2022
- Total fund decrease of \$172 million over FY 2022
  - o Projected decline in enrollment
  - Cost shift to General Fund upon termination of enhanced federal match under the Families
     First Coronavirus Response Act (6.2 percentage points)



## AHCCCS State Fiscal Year 2023 Budget Proposal Administrative Requests

#### Compensation Strategy

 Focus on customer facing positions with highest turnover and lowest compensation -Program Service Evaluators, Customer Service Representatives, Pre-Admission Screening staff, etc.

#### Increased Datacom Charges

\$2,000,000 in total ongoing funding (\$500,000 in General Fund) to cover increased licensing fees, recently passed on by AHCCCS' contracted vendor, for the software used to process over 136 million Medicaid claims and encounters each year

#### • Compliance with Interoperability Rule

 \$1,950,000 in total one-time funding (\$195,000 in General Fund) and \$300,000 in total ongoing funding (\$75,000 in General Fund) to achieve compliance with federal interoperability regulations



## AHCCCS State Fiscal Year 2023 Budget Proposal Administrative Requests

#### PMMIS System Integration Provider

\$9,500,000 in total ongoing funding (\$500,000 in General Fund in FY 2023; \$2,000,000 in General Fund ongoing) to contract with a Systems Integrator to begin the process of replacing the agency's aging Prepaid Medicaid Management Information System (PMMIS)


#### Staffing to Support Integrated Care - American Indian Health Program (AIHP)

- \$587,400 in total ongoing funding (\$178,600 in General Fund) to establish seven new positions when AIHP assumes responsibility for the provision of behavioral health services for 350 individuals designated to have a Serious Mental Illness (SMI) in October 2022
  - Staffing need: two nurse case managers, two prior authorization/utilization review nurses, one supervisor, one administrative assistant, and one clinical care specialist.



## AHCCCS Beneficiary COVID-19 Vaccination Rates


Vaccination Rates by Line of Business

#### **Update on Key Initiatives**

- Continued roll out of Electronic Visit Verification
- Transfer of HEAplus maintenance and operations to Accenture completed on 7/1/21
- Implementation of closed-loop referral system underway fall 2021
- Housing administrator contract implemented on 10/1/21
- Competitive contract expansion RFP released on 8/4/21; proposals submitted on 10/4/21; on course to award on or before 11/15/21
- Renewal of 1115 waiver extended on 9/30/21 for 1 year
- Abuse & Neglect Prevention Task Force quarterly meeting held on 9/27/21
- Workforce transformation effort (consolidation into 801 building) near completion - 69% of AHCCCS staff will work in a virtual office setting long term
- AHCCCS Leadership Academy kick off held on 10/1/21
- AHCCCS Sunset Audit underway; first performance audit report focused on eligibility to be published in early 2022


